Australia and the Cockatiel

The wild cockatiel is a native of Australia. Similar in size to the United States, minus Alaska, Australia has a coastline that borders on three oceans and four seas. Most of Northern Australia has a subtropical climate and a temperate climate in the South region. The vast central plains have an annual rainfall of less than nine inches. There is a gradual increase in rainfall closer towards the coast. The North is covered with a thick rain forest which is influenced by seasonal monsoon rainfalls.

Cockatiels are found all over Australia especially in the interior. More and more they have been seen in coastal areas, but some believe they are escaped cage or aviary birds and their offspring. For the most part, the cockatiel lives in small family groups, an average of twelve. After breeding season, they are sometimes in great flocks where the older ones will drive out the young when food becomes short. This also is when they appear in coastal areas but only for a short time before returning inland.

In the Southern region of Australia, cockatiels are nomadic, constantly moving from one place to another in search of food and water. Here they are affected by the seasonal changes, where in the Northern region they tend to stay put. The cockatiels mainly live in open terrain marked by groups of trees and shrubs, and are never far from a water supply. They spend a large part of the day on the ground searching for food. They are primarily dependent on seeds of acacia and spinifex grass but do eat berries and other fruits, nectar, and insects. Cockatiels like to drink early in the morning and again in the evenings. During the day, especially in the hot midday hours, the birds frequently rest lengthwise along dead tree branches. Their color blends with the branches to provide excellent camouflage.

Today, cockatiels remain somewhat tame and trusting, allowing one to approach within a few yards before flying swiftly, directly, and noisily to the nearest trees. In flight the birds keep contact with each other through their prolonged rolling "kweel-kweel" or "kweelo-kweelo" calls but on the ground when foraging or when sitting in the trees, they are extremely silent. Cockatiels remain one of the fastest flyers among the Australian parrots. Their white wing patches are remarkably conspicuous during flight. These patches enable the birds to keep track of each other so that flocks can more easily stay together. When landing, a cockatiel falls to the ground like a stone, checking its fall only at the last possible moment.

In spite of their fast flight, cockatiels are still a tempting target for birds of prey. They do not stand on the banks of water sources to drink. In fear, they swoop to the left and to the right as they first examine the area for signs of danger. Then they dive to the water surface and snap up drops of water or will land in the shallow water, drink quickly, and depart in a matter of seconds. Take note that the cockatiel can go for a long period of time without water. Research shows that they can withstand periods of drought better than any other parrot-like birds with the exception of the budgerigar.

In the wild, cockatiels breed from August through December depending on the prevailing weather conditions. Cockatiels nest in holes in the tree trunks or in hollow limbs. Many trees in the Australian bush are hollowed out by various termite species, which do not kill the tree but work on the "dead" inner wood of trunks and limbs, thus playing an important role in the ecology of wildlife. If it were not for these termites providing nesting opportunities, the cockatiel could not survive in such great numbers. Cockatiels usually nest in trees that are close to watercourses and will except extremely small cavities, sometimes in a fist sized hole in a branch no bigger than ones arm. The female broods the eggs from late afternoon to early morning, when the cock takes over. Both male and female are conscientious in their duties. This brooding by both sexes is unique in the world of parrots for only a few cockatoos and brush-tongues share this habit. The wild cockatiel will sometimes take a bath before its brooding shift to add moisture to the nest chamber so that humidity levels are maintained around the nest material and the eggs. The cockatiel has a fascinating and unique courtship dance, sadly, not seen in captive birds. The cock first shows off his white shoulder patches before drumming his feet on the ground or on a tree branch in front of the hen. If the hen flies off, the cock will follow, stand in front of her, and again flash his shoulder patches and drum his feet.

The English name cockatiel originates from the Portuguese work <code>Cocatilho</code>, which means small parrot. The German fanciers call the bird <code>Nympensittich</code>, taken from the scientific name(<code>Sittich</code> meaning parakeet) Australians have many different names for the cockatiel derived from the aboriginal native words with "<code>Quarrion</code>" the most well known and widely used. The genus being <code>Nymphicus</code> Hollandicus the cockatiel is a link species between the cockatoos (<code>Cacatuidae</code>) and the "true" parrots (<code>Psittacidae</code>).



The eclectus parrots visual sexual differences between male and female are more marked and striking than in any other parrot. Males are generally green in color where females are generally red.

Their call in flight is a loud, rough screech, repeated continuously or in short bursts. They

have various alarm calls and they have been heard making a more mellow bell like sound before mating.

As pets the eclectus is fun-loving. They love to mimic, while needing lots to do they are generally not demanding.

They can live in captivity for up to 50 years. Their clutches consist of only two.

Sonny came from a very loving family who experienced a major lifestyle change, and were forced to find a new home for Sonny. He is a very friendly bird who steps up easily and loves to cuddle. He gets along with other birds once he gets used to them. He is relatively quiet and enjoys his time out of his cage.

Buddy – 14 YO male Lesser Sulphur Crested Cockatoo

Buddy seems to be a good natured bird who craves human contact. He has been mistreated, however, and bites out of fear. In recent weeks, he has come to trust people and allows petting of his beak, chest, head and legs through the cage bars. His behavior remains unpredictable, however, and he would do best in a home with a seasoned bird owner, where he will receive consistent love and attention.

Mango - 2 YO male Peach Front Conure

Mango is a young, friendly bird who loves fruit, especially dried papaya, and enjoys slowly destroying his wooden toys. He tends to bite your fingers when he steps up, but this is decreasing over time, and I believe he will be a good companion with consistent positive reinforcement from his caregiver. Mango can be a bit noisy, as with most conures, but does not scream excessively.

Roscoe - 10 YO male Nanday Conure

Roscoe is as charming as he is naked!! He has plucked his chest and back repeatedly, and feathers will most likely not grow in these areas. His remaining feathers are beautiful, however, and his tail is long, full, and gorgeous!! He is very friendly, loves a good head scratch, and has a sweet, low voice that sounds like a whisper. He plays vigorously with his toys, and screams for joy while doing it!

Lucky - male Nanday Conure with special needs

Lucky is a very gentle and sweet bird and has only one leg. How and when he lost his leg is unknown; however, he seems to have adapted well to his disability and gets around fine! His cage has been customized to his needs; to minimize injury from falling, but Lucky hardly seems to think he needs it! He can be quite vocal when he greets his family, and thoroughly enjoys company.

Bing - Cherry-Head Conure

Bing was removed from a bad situation and brought to the Bailey Foundation for help. He was plucked in spots, but his feathers have grown nicely and he is learning to trust people again. He says many words, and appears to want to be with people. He will mutter under his breath if people are nearby, but not paying attention to him. He will be a fine companion with patience and understanding.
